Grace and peace to you, my family in Christ! I moved here to Soldotna after serving a congregation in northeastern Oklahoma, where they'd cancel school for a week for less than an inch of snow. To their credit, nobody has plows, sand or salt ready for the roads, or even snow shovels. You just don't need it. And, on top of being spoiled by warm, Oklahoma weather, I had a garage attached to the parsonage where I lived. Even on our cold, 20 degree days, I had a warm vehicle, ready and waiting for me to jump in and drive off with no planning.

And then I moved to Alaska.

With each day of dropping temperatures, many of you have offered me your insight on the best vehicle practices for the winter. Yes, *I did purchase studded tires for my car* and had a pan heater installed, whatever that is. I still feel like I'm living in alternative reality every time I see the plug dangling out of the front of my bumper! Some of you have even asked me if I'm ready to leave town yet with these cold days ahead. I will confess to you that on the mornings where I'm hanging onto the handle of my car door, hoping to pull it hard enough to get the frozen door open, but not so hard that I actually break the handle off...well, I don't care for these freezing temperatures on *those* days. On the contrary, I've found myself actually enjoying the meditative practice of heating my car up.

After a long day working at the church building or even being somewhere else across town, I slide into my seat, turn the key and wait. I wait for the car to heat up, its poor little mechanics chugging away like a steamboat crossing the Atlantic Ocean, enabling me to drive home. I could choose to be irritated at the waste of time it is to wait. I could choose to go back inside and work a little more, making every minute count. Instead, I sit quietly in my freezing car and breathe in the bitter air. I watch my breath slowly escape like wisps of smoke, dancing out of my nostrils and my mouth. I study the ice crystal formation on my windshield, remembering that each snowflake is unique and wondering if this is true of frozen windshields.

While it would be much warmer to sit inside, I've used this time to still my mind, calm my heart and just be. I focus in on my breath, on the frozen stars across my windshield, and ponder what it means to move from my daily work to my home. I study the day in my mind, remembering the things that people said that hurt, then try to let them melt away with the frost. I envision the things that brought me joy, and let them warm my heart for the days ahead.

This season of Advent, much like Lent, is the period of preparation that anticipates the day of celebration ahead. I cannot fully live into the joy of Christmas, if I haven't taken the time to quiet my heart and mind in preparation for Christ's birth into the world. And not just a historical birth of some random baby, but to prepare myself to receive the Christ-child born into *my world*, in 2017. I know that I will get to the Christmas glory of angels singing, beautiful poinsettias and candles illuminating our faces during "Silent Night." But first, I need Advent. I want to sit quietly in the cold, darkness of the season, centering my thoughts on the uniqueness of each frozen star and the gift of life in this world.

Perhaps you are wiser than I am and have a remote starter or a garage, but I invite you to find your moments of cold, car sitting, whether actually or proverbially, in these weeks of Advent ahead. Take some time to breathe, to study, to be. We will get to the sequined party dresses and Christmas carols soon enough. Let us be attentive to this time of waiting, this season of preparation, not only of our homes, but of our hearts. I invite you to find some daily meditation, somehow, somewhere, to prepare for the Christ-child's birth into *your* world.

ADVENT

This Sunday marks the first of four Sundays of Advent in our church year. Advent is a time when we can take in a deep breath and pause to ponder what the birth of the Christ-child means for the world today. Our worship space will look different, beginning first with the Advent wreath and then gradually increasing in our decorations. The Advent wreath, according to Gertrud Mueller Nelson, referenced in Sundays and Seasons, "...can be traced to the Roman's ancient rite of waiting in the darkness for the return of the sun, and for the Feast of the Sun on December 25. The ancients...took a wheel off their wagons and fastened torches to it to see them through the darkness. The only thing alive in the winter, evergreen, was brought inside and fastened to the wheel. To those huddled in darkness, it was a sign of vegetation and springtime. More than three hundred years ago, German Christians fashioned the same elements into the Advent wreath—the greens a sign of hope and eternity. What was once a Feast of the Sun has become for us the Feast of the Son."


YOUTH CHRISTMAS TOY DRIVE

FREEDOM HOUSE

Freedom House is a faith-based sober living house for women here in Soldotna. Most staying at Freedom House are coming from prison or rehab and seeking support to remain sober. They learn life skills for their future, while being immersed in scripture and the reminder that God loves them. Freedom House is currently providing a home for six women.

Per requests, they have come up with a Christmas wish list for the House: sectional couch (has to wrap around a corner), a computer, a printer, Microsoft Word package, women's underwear (all sizes) and socks.

The "Freedom House" food pantry is also running low. They could use: granola bars, instant oatmeal, single serving cold cereal, canned soups and vegetables, macaroni, bottled water, etc.

This year, as in the previous three years, we don't want to change the whole world, but we do want to change one village. More than a billion people worldwide lack access to clean water. A woman or child in sub-Saharan Africa will walk an average of 3.7 miles every day to get water, not all of it clean. Helping a community construct and maintain a well opens a world of opportunity. This year we would like to collect enough money to furnish one village with a well and change their world. The cost is \$2,500. If you want to see what difference a well can make in the life of a village and what some of the conditions are in sub-Saharan Africa read *A long Walk to Water* by Linda Sue Park.
