

Dear Friends in Christ,

The other day I was thinking. I have been a pastor for 36 years. If I include the work I did for a congregation before seminary, the work I did for the Salvation Army, a Lutheran retirement center and nursing home, and with mentally challenged people at Columbus State Institute while I was in seminary it's been over 40 years.

During that time I have seen a lot of things come and go. I have seen a number of different approaches to ministry and of reaching people with God's Word and his love. For a while we tried the "Field of Dreams" approach - build it and they will come. In those days it often wasn't the problem of getting them to come as much as getting them to stay. There was the era of going to people's houses, knocking on doors, finding if they had a church, and if they didn't inviting them to come to church. The result: a lot of sore knuckles, tired feet, and doors slammed in faces with few results. Then we were reminded that Lutherans only invited someone to church once every 20-30 years so we were guilty to go and invite. The problem was while we invited we often weren't there to welcome them when they came. There was the era of 12 steps to an effective church, 40 surefire tips for increasing attendance, parish planning, surviving the future, and more. For a while it was all about programs and groups. We had groups for those with teens, infants, divorced, singles, twenty-something, thirty-something, empty nesters, and more. Don't get me wrong; these were good things but your success was measured by how many groups you had.

Now we are in the discipleship/missional age. This is good stuff. It is getting back to basics. Part of what we are called to do is to demonstrate Jesus' love to others through the things we do. Much of this involves dealing with our unchurched friends and neighbors who we know and who already know we are a little strange. It is about servant evangelism, giving a helping hand so people can see Jesus rather than knocking on doors.

None of these have been bad things. Some of them have worked and some haven't. We can have a thousand programs, the most beautiful buildings, do thousands of random acts of kindness and love, and more but what people want is to see the face of Jesus, to hear his voice, to feel his love and experience his forgiveness. But in order for this to happen there is one key. That key is your personal story: why is God important to you, how have you seen him in your life, what difference has he made in your life. People can read the Bible from cover from cover and get all the facts but what they want is to experience, to encounter the living Lord. They want to hear, to see, to know this God and one of the main ways this happens is through you when you share how he has touched your life.



We are collecting yarn for women at Wildwood Prison who are crocheting articles for people in the community. There is a box outside of Randy's office for your donations.


