Dear Friends in Christ,

A couple months ago I was having coffee with Jesus. Some of you might not be familiar with this phrase but it is my term for my morning devotional time. I had gone through a brief time of prayer following *The Divine Hours*, which is a literary and liturgical reworking of the sixth-century Benedictine Rule of fixed-hour prayer, read my psalm, read part of Mark's gospel, and read some sections from two other devotional books and settled down to pray. That's when the difficulty hit.

All of the sudden it seemed as if I was talking to hear myself talk. I found myself using the same words I always use as if I was on autopilot. It was similar to saying the Lord's Prayer in church some Sundays where I find my mouth saying the words and my mind being somewhere else. It can often sound like this: "Our Father who art in heaven hallowed be your name (I wonder what her name is. For the life of me I just can't remember it). Your kingdom come, your will be done (when is this worship service ever going to be done) on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread (speaking of daily bread I'm getting kind of hungry. I can't wait to get home. I hope the roast in the crockpot is finished) and forgive us our trespasses...You get the point.

My next thought was, "Pull yourself together. Focus. Concentrate." That didn't work either. The harder I tried to pray the more it just sounded like empty words floating out into space. Then all of the sudden it hit me. Why was it so important for me to fill the air with my words? Obviously what I had to say at that moment wasn't all that important.

I decided to try something different. I said, "God, I don't have anything to say right now, but I guess you already know that." (I have to admit there are times I'm a little slow on the uptake). "I don't know if you have anything you want to tell me or not, but if you do I'll listen. But if you don't could we just sit here and enjoy each other's company? Could we just hang out together without having to say anything?"

So I picked up my coffee cup and God and I watched the sunrise together. As I watched the sun filter through the trees that are across the street from my house and watched the sky turn pink and then blue I discovered something I had been seeking for a long time but hadn't found lately – a feeling of peace seemed to wash over me.

Now I'm not foolish enough to believe I will have this same experience every day if I follow the same pattern. What I do know is this: there are times to speak and times to be quiet and we need both of these in our lives. I also know that hanging out with your best friend in the whole world is an important part of life. So when's the last time you had a cup of coffee with Jesus and watched the sunrise or sunset? When's the last time you just sat in the room or lay in bed or took a walk and invited Jesus to come along, without needing to say anything or expecting to hear anything? Sometimes words don't have to be spoken to share each other's presence.


