Dear Friends in Christ,

There are times on Sunday morning when people will come out of church and say, “I know you were talking to me today.” My comment is almost always the same: “I’m glad God spoke to you through what I was saying but I was talking to myself.” The same is true with most of these letters; I pray they will speak to you, but I want you to realize I am not singling out any particular person other than myself.

Back in the 1970’s and 1980’s a great deal of the literature that was being written about the end of the 20th century and the beginning of the 21st century was about the four day work week, the possibility of working only 32 hours a week, increased leisure time, and how we were going to spend our free time. Here we are in the 21st century and the facts are these: Despite technology we are working longer hours than we did 50 years ago. We are working more than medieval peasants. Mandatory overtime is at near record levels. On the average we work nearly nine full weeks (350 hours) LONGER per year than our peers in Western Europe. Working Americans average a little over two weeks of vacation a year while Europeans average five to six weeks.

Before the Net, cell phones and iPhones, the lines between work and leisure time were markedly clearer. People left their offices at a predictable time, were often completely disconnected from and out-of-touch with their jobs as they traveled to and from work, and were off-duty once they were home. That's no longer true. Even in a competitive job market, employers expect workers to put in longer hours and to be available almost constantly via fax, cell, e-mail, text, etc. Bosses, colleagues and family members -- lovers, buddies and spouses too -- expect instant responses to voice-and e-mail messages. Young married couples report that they work an average 26 per cent more hours each year than they did 30 years ago.

A few more facts: 24% of employees and 47% of management put in 6 or more hours of work a week without pay. Sixty-nine percent of employees report that work is a significant source of stress and 41% say they typically feel tense or stressed out during the workday. Job stress is estimated to cost U.S. industry more than \$300 billion a year in absenteeism, turnover, diminished productivity and medical, legal and insurance costs. Eighty-three percent of employees report going to work even while sick, citing heavy workload, need to conserve time off to meet family needs, and a work environment where taking time off is “risky” as their rationale. Teenagers in the US are experiencing higher levels of stress than adults.

Now here is the sad part – we wear our busyness as a badge of courage and honor. The typical exchange after, “How are you,” is “Busy”. We claim to hate it yet we wear it proudly. We have great expectations for our children and put tremendous pressure on them to succeed. We want them to stay out of trouble so we make sure they are always busy. So when do we have time to rest? When do we have time to recharge? When do we have time to just hang out with God and rest in his presence?

One final thought – no answers – just a thought. The Chinese symbol for busy is a combination of the symbols heart and death. The cross is a symbol of “Come to me all you who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest.” Which are we going to choose?



CROCHETING THEIR WAY MINISTRY



Wildwood Pre-Trial is a multiple use facility with an operating capacity of 113 beds. The population includes: pre-trial detainees for the Kenai Peninsula, short term sentenced prisoners, long term sentenced prisoners awaiting bed space at other institutions, and non-criminal remands. This ministry was started by a few women in our community (Episcopal, Methodist and ELCA) over a year ago by invitation from the Superintendent. They have all been trained and participated in Kairos Prison Ministries of Alaska and have Religious Volunteer Authorization cards. This is the only program in the state that allows volunteers to go into the dorm and use the women's living room. The women also have access to the crochet hooks and yarn in their cells. They have collected yarn (and money for yarn) from various sources (churches, friends, businesses, etc.) and once a week visit each of the two women's wings. There are anywhere from 10-20 women participating. The women are issued one plastic crochet hook upon request (provided by the department) and most of the items that they produce are collected and distributed in our community (KPBSD Students in Transition, Food bank, Homeless Connection, the LeeShore Center, the Transitional Living Center and community fund-raising auctions) and various communities in our state (baby booties to Nome, hats to Anchorage's Beans Café and the Anchorage Domestic Violence Center).

We are collecting yarn for women at Wildwood Prison who are crocheting articles for people in the community. There is a box outside of Randy's office for your donations.






WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY
